JCC Williamsburg Master Gardener Tours of WBG

The James City County Williamsburg Master Gardener Association, Virginia Cooperative Extension Volunteers, approved the project in establishing the WBG Tour Guides. Patsy McGrady and Mitzi Balma, MG Class of 2010, signed onto the project and now co-chair the effort. Carolyn Will, Helen Hamilton, Gary Driscole, Brian Taber, Donna Ware, and Angela Cingale introduced Patsy and Mitzi to the garden -explaining the history, goals, and objectives of WBG and discussing the structure and content of the various sections of the WBG. Eight additional Master Gardeners from the Class of 2011 joined the project. The tour guides constantly update their information as the garden expands and new plant materials are introduced into the landscape. The 2012 tour guides comprise of Mitzi, Ken Caro, Iris Grant, Cathy Hill, Valerie Hillyer, Patsy, Gary Streb, Nancy Bayne, Vincent Rasper, and Jordan Westenhaver.

The group's goal is to keep developing information on each of the 15 distinct garden sections and showcases specific plants according to the season. This information will provide greater depth to the tours and be a valuable resource for new people joining the MG project. Between 2010 and 2011 the group has provided tours to both adult and children's groups totaling over 150 visitors. As an added feature this year, with the daffodils blooming in and around the garden, Mitzi prepared an informative and enjoyable presentation on Daffodils which was a crowd pleaser. Tours are generally provided on a per request

basis and can be arranged by sending the webmaster an e-mail. The group

successfully conducted two

scheduled tours on "The WBG in Spring" for 28 people. Based on this initial success, the group expects to make the spring tour an annual event and is considering adding a "The WBG in Fall" scheduled tour also.

There are currently 4 James City County Williamsburg Master Gardener Interns, Maggie McCain, Becky Palmore, LaMonica Samuel, and Nancy Schusheim training to become tour guides for the latter part of 2012.

There are other opportunities for Master Gardener tours of the garden with the opening of the Interpretive Center in Freedom Park complete with full time staff, museum, picnic tables, and other facilities is bringing more visitors and greater visibility. And the newest addition, "Go Ape", is also bringing community members to explore and request a tour of the garden. The 2012-2013 garden season promises to be very busy for the tour guides.
